- 2. <u>Hands On:</u> Members should inspect their pens and housing for hazards before bringing animals home.
- 3. Knowledge: Members should research the history and purpose of the breed of their swine project animal.

Activity: Fly Swatter Knowledge Game

Swine Breeds Version

Lesson:

First, use the Swine Resource Handbook to discuss and view the different breeds with your members. Help your members determine which breed they own or want to raise. The leader will then paste printed images and words to a wall and have members form two teams that line up single file facing the wall with images.

Hand the first member in each line a fly swatter. The members at the front of the line will race to the wall to swat their answer to the question the leader reads. The first member to swat the correct answer receives a point for their team and the fly swatter moves to the next team members in line. Leaders can require members to wait to race until saying "Go!" at the end of the question before racing to the wall to swat.

Swine Products

Did you know hogs provide you with more than just pork? The following items are made from parts of the hog: bone china, rennet for cheese, stearin for chewing gum, glycerin, leather goods, gelatin, drum heads, violin strings, artist paint brushes and industrial lubricants. You may want to research and make a display board explaining the different products and what part of the hog they come from.

ig Facts

- It takes a pig only 5 to 6 months to go from birth to 240 to 260 pounds (Market Weight).
- It takes 550 to 600 pounds of feed for a feeder pig weighing 40 pounds to reach 240 pounds.
- A hog will gain 1 pound for every 2.5 to 3 pounds of feed it consumes.
- More pork is consumed than any other meat in the world.
- Hogs raised in groups of 25 or more inside a finishing building need 8 square feet of space each. Pigs raised as 4-H projects in small numbers need more
- Pigs have no sweat glands, so they need to be cooled in very hot weather.
 - White pigs get sunburned easily. Provide plenty of shade.


The points to look for in a good hog are listed in the picture below. Visit a local fair and observe how the judge uses this model to pick the winner.

If you are going to be responsible for marketing your hogs you should know the retail parts and their value.


Visit the grocery story and check out the price of the different cuts of meat.
